### Did You Know .....by Ron Hill

My little story this month will focus on the Rideau Canal. This canal is the oldest continuously run canal in North America. It was built between 1826 and 1832 and goes from Kingston on Lake Ontario to Ottawa on the Ottawa River. This canal is about 125 miles long and makes use of the Cataraqui River, Rideau Lake and the Rideau River. To join these bodies of water into a canal system it took about 12 miles of manmade canals and locks.

The reason for building the canal was to provide a safe supply route between Kingston on Lake Ontario and Montreal on the St. Lawrence River. As you remember, the War of 1812 had just been fought between the U.S.A. and Canada (then British Colonies). Travel via the St. Lawrence would become dangerous if problems arose.

The Duke of Wellington who had commanded the British Army that had defeated Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo, had advocated in 1819 that a Rideau Canal system should be built as a defence system for Canada. So it was that in 1826 the go-ahead approval was given and the canal was started.

Control for building the canal was under the direction of Lt. Colonel John By of the Royal Engineers. But it was hundreds of local tradesmen, smiths, masons, carpenters, etc. who did the work. In addition to these, thousands of Irish immigrants and French Canadians were used to dig the dirt, chop down the trees, move stones, etc. All work was done by hand with the help of oxen and horses. It is written that many workers contracted malaria and died.

In addition to the canal dug by hand, about 50 dams were necessary to control the water levels at

rapids on the rivers. They needed 46 locks as well to raise the boats about 270 ft. between Ottawa and Lake Ontario. Most of the locks are still operated by hand using the same mechanisms that were used to operate the locks in 1832.

The exact number of workers that died is unavailable. But with worker camps that contained women and children that total number through sickness and accidents could be between 800 to 1000 people over the six year span.

The headquarters for Colonel By's camps were set up at the mouth of the Rideau River where it joined the Ottawa. It became known as Bytown. In 1855 the name Bytown was changed to Ottawa and in 1857, I believe (or there abouts), Queen Victoria selected it as the capital of Upper and Lower Canada (Ontario and Quebec).

Since the War of 1812-15, no military concerns have occurred between Canada and the U.S.A. So, the Rideau Canal was never used for defence purposes, but it played a vital role in the development of Canada. Since the canal was easier to navigate than the St. Lawrence River, it saw a lot of commercial use as the trade route. Thousands of immigrants also used the canal as a route to head westward as they come to settle in Canada.

Today, the Rideau Canal is a great tourist attraction. It is the only canal in North America dating from the canal building era that remains operational as it was originally built. It is designated a National Historic Site of Canada. In winter, the Ottawa section of the canal can become the largest skating area in the world sometimes.

In 2012, the Government of Canada cut the budget of the Rideau Canal by 20%. It is our hope that government will not lose sight of the fact how important the canal is in Canada's history.

**Willingness Study results presented to Community Liaison Committee**

**SOUTH BRUCE, ON** – Following several months of extensive consultation, a summary of the South Bruce community’s feedback on *how* to measure willingness to host the Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) Project which would store used nuclear fuel was presented to the Community Liaison Committee (CLC).

Katrina McCullough, Community Engagement Specialist with GHD Limited – the consultant that led the Study independent of the NWMO – addressed the CLC members and the public Thursday evening.

McCullough discussed the various methods that the community participated, including virtual and in-person workshops, an online survey, workbooks, telephone calls, and more. A total of 230 individuals participated in the process through one or more of the engagement activities.

Participants had a range of ideas on how willingness could be measured, with the majority preferring a public referendum as fair, anonymous and clear.

The timing of the referendum and whether it should be the only indicator of South Bruce’s willingness to host the Project were also discussed as important factors. Some participants expressed concerns specific to a public referendum including low voter turnout, voters not being adequately informed, and the potential to cause deeper division in the community.

Several other themes emerged through these discussions as well, such as the need clear and accessible information regarding the process and studies related to the Project to make an informed decision. The community also stressed that broad participation and engagement is critical, and that trust and transparency are paramount. In September, GHD shared the draft report with the community. Study participants had the opportunity to ensure that their input was included and to provide any feedback.

In early November, the final report, which will reflect comments raised during the report back period, will be presented to South Bruce Council for their review. Following that, Council will consider what the community expressed and decide on a defined process for determining willingness.

### **Municipality of South Bruce adopts Strategic, Economic Development Plans**

SOUTH BRUCE, ON – South Bruce Council adopted both a new Corporate Strategic Plan, and an Economic Development Strategy Update for the Municipality at a recent Council Meeting.

The Corporate Strategic Plan is designed to be a guide for Council and staff in the next several years (2021-2025). The plan lays out key goals, such as fostering a favourable business environment, attracting investors and residents, and promoting environmentally sustainable practices throughout the community, among others.

The development of the Plan was made possible through engagement activities with residents, businesses, service groups, Municipal staff, and Council members through the spring of 2021. Participants had the opportunity to share their thoughts on the strengths and weaknesses in the Municipality, in order to provide a clear path on next steps and improvements.

In a message to the public, Mayor Robert Buckle stated that the Corporate Strategic Plan “presents us with great opportunities and concrete actions to undertake in the next few years.”

“I look forward to working together to continue to improve how we operate, offer services, and advance common interests for the betterment of all

the communities that make up our Municipality,” he added.

Similarly, the Economic Development Strategy Update was also prepared earlier this year with valuable input from the community.

The Update highlights three Strategic Objectives for economic development, which are Foundations & Follow-Through, Agri-Business Reboot, and Village Revival. Each of these Objectives is detailed with additional priorities and actions.

The Executive Summary notes that the Update was prepared factoring in “normal community growth, not including the ongoing NWMO Project.”

Separate economic development studies and planning will be done next year which will consider the potential impact of the Project if it is ultimately sited in South Bruce.

Both the Corporate Strategic Plan and the Economic Development Strategy Update were prepared by MDB Insight, the Canadian consulting company which was retained by the Municipality for the development of the previous Strategic and Economic Development Plans.

### **Teeswater Medical Centre Development Steering Committee provides key updates**

SOUTH BRUCE, ON – The Teeswater Medical Centre Development Steering Committee has been working for nearly two years to bring the vision of a new, fully accessible and modern medical centre to the community of Teeswater. Some excellent progress has been made in recent months, and the Committee is proud to have purchased, with the support of Council, a facility that will be renovated into the new medical centre, as well as the adjacent land for parking or further development.

The committee has undertaken extensive research and reviewed of a number of aspects of the operation of a medical centre, including the layout and design; the required equipment; potential opportunities for public-private partnerships; and the most effective methods for operating and providing oversight of the facility and its operations. The following is an overview of the current status of the project.

#### **Building Acquisition and Renovation**

The properties at 26 and 28 Clinton Street South have been purchased by the Municipality, on behalf of the Committee. Preliminary drawings have been completed for renovations of the former Studio 410

building to include 2 doctor's offices and exam rooms, pharmacy, a reception area, staff washroom and lunchroom, rental offices and elevator for basement floor access.

### Business Model

An important part of the operation of the medical clinic is the business model that will define how the facility is operated. The Business Model Subcommittee has spent considerable time researching other clinics and systems in order to be able to recommend a community-based, cost-effective system.

Based on their research, the Subcommittee is recommending the medical clinic follow a not-for-profit management structure for the facility to ensure that it operates without taxpayer funding for operating expenses. The Committee and the Municipality are presently seeking legal opinion on the proposed not-for-profit structure.

### Fundraising

The project is now entering a very important phase, which is the capital funding campaign. To date, the Committee has been fortunate to have the support of the Wingham and District Hospital Foundation, who have generously provided the services of their Executive Director, Nicole Duquette, to guide and lead the discussions around fundraising. Nicole conducted a feasibility study to determine the ability of the community to support the project and it's proposed capital budget of just over one million dollars. Thanks to her work and leadership, the Committee feels confident that the capital campaign fundraising goal can be reached. In the very near future, the Fundraising Subcommittee will be moving forward with a formal capital fundraising campaign.

After many months of meetings with constructive and informative discussions, the Committee looks forward to moving into the next stages of fundraising, renovating, and establishing the management structure for the facility, with the support of Council and the community.

### Municipality of South Bruce recognizes National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

SOUTH BRUCE, ON – The Municipality of South Bruce joins with Canadians across the country in marking Orange Shirt Day and the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

“Today, we acknowledge the past and present wrongdoings towards Indigenous Canadians, particularly through the residential school system. On behalf of Council and staff I encourage all South Bruce residents to take time to learn from history, and commit to putting Reconciliation into action in

our community, today and on a regular basis,” said Mayor Robert Buckle.

The Municipality has taken steps to acknowledge and recognize National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, by lowering flags to half-mast on municipal flag poles and encouraging staff to wear orange shirts to honour the survivors of the residential school system and raise awareness about this tragic chapter in history.

Furthermore, the Municipality has and will continue to take actions to promote education, respect and understanding among staff, Council and the community as part of the process of reconciliation. Council recently adopted a Land Acknowledgement to be offered at the beginning of Council and Committee meetings, to recognize that the Municipality lies within the traditional territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, and encourage respect for and awareness of Indigenous people.

As well, Council directed staff to find opportunities for Reconciliation training that would be made available to all in the community, building on Cultural Awareness training that Council, Community Liaison Committee, and staff members received a couple of years ago.

“We hope that these actions will help our staff, Council and community members continue on the important journey towards reconciliation with Indigenous Communities,” said CAO/Clerk Leanne Martin.

“The Municipality will continue to reflect on, and seek guidance on ways we can genuinely do our part to deepen our understanding and put reconciliation into action,” added Martin.

The Municipality recognizes that this day may be particularly difficult for survivors of the residential school system and the families of those who’s lives were lost, and notes that support is available 24 hours a day through the National Indian Residential School Crisis Line, at 1-866-925-4419.
