

Did You Knowby Ron Hill

In reading the April 29th edition of the "Town Crier", I noted an article which indicated the price of single family homes had increased about 33% to 45% since the year 2020. It made me think back to the price of some of the great land purchases a long time ago.

My first thought was on the value of "Louisiana Purchase" which occurred in 1814. After General Wolfe captured Quebec in 1759, England gained control of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec and Ontario land masses. But the French explorer LaSalle had explored the Mississippi and the French had stated a colony at New Orleans. All this land remained with France.

In 1814 Napoleon, the leader of France was at war with most of Europe. He was running low on money so he sold this land to the American Colonies (U.S.A.) for \$14,000,000. It was called the "Louisiana Purchase" and included all of the land drained by the Mississippi River and its tributaries. Today that would be 20 to 25 American states. Up until now, the States or the Thirteen Colonies as it was known by consisted of land along the eastern shore of the Atlantic only. The \$14,000,000 would be the price of 9 or 10 Culross farms in today's prices.

Another purchase, also by the USA occurred in 1867. At this point in time land along the Pacific coast was being haggled for. Fur trading was still the major activity in the area. Rivalry between the Hudson's Bay Co. and the American companies was quite strong. For a time, the Hudson's Bay Co. controlled all the land between California and the Russian territory of Alaska. The British Colony of British Columbia had its boundaries set in the south but not in the north of the province.

But on July 1st, 1867, the Americans purchased Alaska from the Russians for \$7,000,000. So, on the same day Canada became a country the state of Alaska became American territory.

The last big purchase I'll mention took place in 1869. Canada became a country in 1867. It consisted then of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario. Ontario and Quebec were still known as Upper and Lower Canada. The first prime minister, Sir John A. MacDonald did a remarkable job, I think in the next few years.

He persuaded Manitoba to join the country in 1870 and in 1871; the territory of British Columbia was also persuaded. Part of the deal was to construct a railroad over a ten year period to connect it with the rest of Canada. In 1873, he persuaded P.E.I to become the third Atlantic province.

It was in 1869, however when MacDonald made a big deal. He persuaded Great Britain and The Hudson's Bay Company (H.B.C) to sell their land to Canada. The H.B.C had been in existence for 200 years. It sold the land to Canada for \$300,000 English pounds or about \$1,300,000 in that era. This included all of the land drained by the rivers flowing into Hudson Bay. The major river is the Saskatchewan which has its beginnings in the Rocky Mountains and flows eastward in Hudson Bay. It also included all the land in present day Northern Ontario and Quebec. In 1906, this western territory entered

Canada under the name of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Although MacDonald was defeated in the 1873 election, he returned as prime minster and saw the completion of the railroad in November 1885.

So the greater part of North America is owned by the U.S.A and Canada. When you think of the purchase price for a lot of it compared to today's prices, the amounts are simply awesome.

July is usually hot and a time for relaxing. It is also the time when crops planted in the spring are maturing and growing. Just as the crops are dependent upon summer rains not only to grow but to survive so our spiritual development is dependent upon our frequenting the sacraments and receiving the Blood of Christ. In the Catholic Church, the month of July is dedicated to the Precious Blood of Jesus

The Blood that coursed through the veins of Christ was a part of that Sacred Humanity made possible by the maternity of Mary, whose parents, St. Joachim and St. Anne are honored this month (July 26). Our Lord's blood poured out on the Cross purchased our salvation, washed clean the robes of the martyrs, and gave birth to the Church as it flowed from his wounded side. The Precious Blood of Christ continues its salvific work, preserving and purifying, repairing and providing nourishment for regeneration and renewal of its members.

July's longer and warmer days also provide us with the opportunity for renewal, both interior and exterior. Schedules relax and pressures ease, inviting travel (hopefully). The summer Readings of Ordinary Time remind us that our earthly pilgrimage is also a journey, a great adventure towards union with Christ, the Beginning and the End of our journey. Each Sunday with its Easter renewal becomes a mile marker along the way, linking where we have been, with where we are going. May the Precious Blood of Jesus sustain

us as we journey to our true home, with Mary and the angels as our companions on the way.

Pope Francis announced the establishment of a World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly at his Sunday Angelus in January of this year. The chosen day for the yearly celebration is the fourth Sunday of July, as it coincides with the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne, Jesus' grandparents.

During his presentation, Pope Francis reminded us about grandparents: "Their voice is precious because it sings the praises of God and safeguards the roots of peoples. They remind us that old age is a gift and that grandparents are the link between generations, passing on the experience of life and faith to the young. Grandparents are often forgotten and we forget this wealth of preserving roots and passing on."

Cardinal Kevin J. Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life, sees the yearly event as "a gift to the whole church" since it stresses the importance of the pastoral care of the elderly as "a priority that can no longer be postponed by any Christian community." Many of our elderly live alone and are often lonely; this is our chance to let them know they matter to the Church and the community.

We pray all grandparents and the elderly, that through the care and love of family, friends and our Church community, they will come to know that God is with them always.

On June 30, Sacred Heart Church, Teeswater and Immaculate Conception Church, Formosa welcomed our new Pastor, Fr. Paul Edmondstone who comes to us from St. Ann Parish, Ancaster, where he was the Associate Pastor for the last year. Fr. Anderson was assigned to St. Mary of the Purification Church in Mount Forest and its missions in St. Thomas, Harriston and St. Peter, Ayton. We thank Fr. Anderson for his faithful and loving service to his parishioners here and may God continue to richly bless and watch over him in his new Parish. We look forward to getting to know Fr. Edmondstone and showing him our South Bruce hospitality!
